








Fair Coin by E.C. Myers
When evil versions of himself and best friend Nate appear one day, teenaged Ephraim embarks on a dangerous odyssey through parallel worlds to make things right.




Variant by Robison Wells


Hourglass by Myra McEntire

In a savage post-nuclear world, four young fugitives attempt to overthrow the bloodthirsty rule of the Overlords with the help of Shade, their mysterious mentor.




The Obsidian Blade by Pete Hautman

Chronicles the off-beat and occasionally extraterrestrial journeys, notions, and acquaintances of galactic traveler Arthur Dent.



When You Reach Me by Rebecca Stead



The Time Fetch by Amy Herrick


